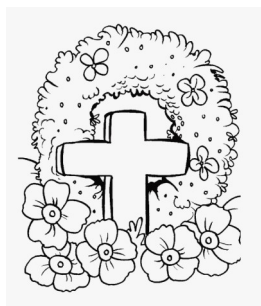

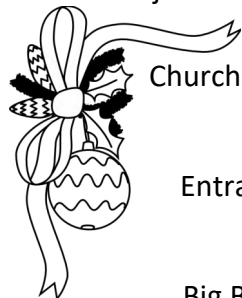

The Archaeology of Wouldham (Part 2)

Hello again residents of Wouldham and welcome to our second instalment of 'The Archaeology of Wouldham' as we approach the start of the journey into our village's past.

Now, although this is a Wouldham Parish magazine it will be necessary to look at the wider landscape in order to gain an understanding of our ancestors that lived and worked the land around us since the last Ice Age. Therefore, modern borders and parish boundaries will need to be put to one side as we include our neighbouring villages of Burham, Eccles, Aylesford, Borsal, and even Rochester. To understand our own village, we need to know where that village is within the wider contemporary landscape.

I aim to start with the earliest of chronological phases, the prehistoric period which can be divided into the Mesolithic periods (8000-4000BC), the Neolithic period (4000-2200BC), the Bronze Age (2200-700BC) and the Iron Age (700BC – AD 43) and then move to the Romans (AD 43 – 410), the Anglo-Saxons (AD 410 – 1066) and the medieval period (AD 1066 – 1500). The post-medieval (AD 1500-1800) and modern period (AD 1800+) will then also be considered, and importantly so, because the Wouldham that we know today was largely shaped around industry, in particular the lime and cement works.

But to start at the beginning, as David Copperfield said, we venture beyond the Mesolithic period and briefly touch on the earliest recorded archaeological remains which date to the 'Old Stone Age', or to use the correct terminology, the Palaeolithic period 650,000 years ago, a period that is distinguished by the original development of stone tools. Kent is an important place for Palaeolithic archaeology, having far more recorded finds than any other county. The reason for this? Well, flint is commonly found as nodules within the natural Chalk and southern England has plenty. The deposits containing Palaeolithic tools are often deeply buried, so they are usually only exposed by quarrying or major construction projects. They are also difficult to find and yet just up the road at Ebbsfleet evidence for a number of sites have been recorded with Neanderthal occupation dating back 60,000 years.

Wouldham has three records which date to this period: a handaxe which was found at Starkey's Farm, mammal bone and shellfish recorded at Rings Hill Farm, and within the vicinity of Wouldham Hall numerous bones from Ice Age mammals. Add to this the mammoth tusk found during the quarry works at the top of Knowle Road (have a look at the Wouldham Village History website: <http://www.wouldhamvillage.com/peterswouldhamhall.html>) and we can start to piece together the jigsaw of our past.

The archaeology of Wouldham and the surrounding landscape will become much larger as, over the next few editions of the magazine, we explore recent archaeological remains associated with Peters Village, the new school, and Margetts Pit adding to the myriad of archaeological material already known on our doorsteps.

Lifebuoys

As we all live near a very fast-moving river, it is vital that all our lifebuoys are always fit for purpose. They are checked monthly by Councillors and should only be opened in case of emergency. What if it was your son/daughter, mother/father that needed saving and there was no life equipment available?

Recreation Ground

There have been a few reports of ‘uncontrolled/aggressive’ dogs using the recreation ground. ALL DOGS MUST be kept under control and not cause stress to other dogs or members of the public.

It is an offence under the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 for a dog to be dangerously out of control and to put a person in fear of being attacked. The main points of the Act are:

- a magistrate can issue a control order which could result in the dog being destroyed. The owner can also be fined or receive a prison sentence of up to six months or both.
- if your dog bites a person the sentence is increased to a fine or a prison sentence up to two years or both.
- if your dog attacks and injures another animal you could be sued in a county court for the damages caused.

You must therefore inform the dog warden who will investigate and take the appropriate action.

October - November in Your Garden



How beautifully leaves grow old. How full of light and colour are their last days.'

As the nights draw in and the temperatures drop, so do the autumn leaves. One of the most wonderful sights of the gardening year is the warm hues of autumn leaves as they fall to the ground and create a multi-coloured carpet across once grey pavements. Be sure to enjoy this last blast of colour before the winter months arrive – wrap up warm for an autumnal walk in parks and forests to really make the most of it.

Autumn is often seen as a time to 'put the garden away for winter', but there is often still routine jobs that can be done through autumn and in winter, if the weather allows. Resist, if you can, to be too tidy as leaving some stems, twigs and leaves lying on the ground or in situ before being cut back, will aid hibernation of many of our beneficial insects. Clearing can wait until spring if you can bear it. However, raking up (most of the) fallen leaves is an essential job to maintain the lawn – but they can be swept into beds and borders & left to rot down, or collected up into sacks or a separate pile to create leaf-mould, which is an excellent soil improver.

If you haven't given hedges a final tidy, then do this before November ideally, as by then some birds are already eying up nesting sites ready for early next year. Choose a fine (frost free), dry day to do this to minimise damage to leaves and to give the stems time to heal over before dusk.

Autumn is the best time to be planting spring bulbs – classics such as Narcissi, Hyacinth, Snowdrops, Aconites, Crocus and Anemones can all be planted in Sept/Oct, but wait until Nov if you are planting out Tulips & Alliums. For something a bit different, choose Fritillaria (there are tall Crown Imperial, or smaller Raddeana, or Meleagris which is great for naturalising), Squill (great for coastal locations) or Erythronium (great for shady borders). Bulbs can be planted into pots (use the lasagne method to really make the most of the space by layering up bulbs – largest at the bottom and smallest at the top), into borders either in clumps or drifts for the best impact, or into lawn to naturalise.

Any new planting should also be done before the end of October, whilst the soil still retains some warmth, but has the advantage of the autumn rain to maintain moisture. Shrubs can be planted out, and even weary perennials can be lifted, divided and replanted in autumn if the conditions are still warm and reasonably dry. Small trees can be planted too, but make sure to stake them as winter winds can cause wind rock, which will weaken roots. Ensure you have

some evergreen shrubs in your garden to give interest through the winter months too – Holly, Yew, Sarcococca and Viburnum all do well in our climate and can be maintained at the size and shape appropriate to your garden. They can also be topiarised if you so wish.

In the vegetable garden things will be slowing down for winter, and it is a time for prep for the next growing season. However, there are plenty of crops that will continue to grow and give a harvest through winter if you have planted them out through the summer months. Brussel Sprouts, Kale, Cabbages, Leeks, Carrots and parsnips will all be quite happy to grow in the ground over winter. Finish harvesting remaining tomatoes, chillies and peppers, and prepare squashes for storage over the next few months. If you keep them in a cool dry place then they should keep perfectly well until December at least. If you have a real glut of veg then they can all be frozen, either raw, or prepped into soups and sauces ready to be used straight away. Spring cabbages can also be planted out now – but is a job to be done sooner, rather than later. If you are lucky enough to have a greenhouse, some crops can be grown on under cover, salads will be fine until it gets too cold, but consider sowing some winter salad leaves instead. Also brassicas can be grown under cover – purple sprouting broccoli for example – should be happy in the greenhouse until space is needed for other crops in spring.

Other things to be doing in the garden now:

- Harvest Apples and Pears, & store any excess for use through winter. These can also be frozen for use in pies and crumbles.
- Continue to mow the lawn if it is still growing, however cut on a higher setting than in the summer to avoid damage. Consider spiking the lawn if it has compacted areas – using a garden fork is fine – and brush in a mix of sand and compost to help aerate the ground.
- Empty pots with summer bedding in & replace with winter bedding plants to give some extra colour through winter. Heathers, Ivy, Pansies and Cyclamen are all hardy through the winter, & pop a few spring bulbs in to prolong the display into spring.
- Sow crops for early spring such as Broad Beans and Peas. Also Garlic and Onions can be planted out now.
- Autumn is bare-root season, so can be ideal for Roses, Fruit Trees and hedging. Prepare your planting space before they arrive as its important to plant these as soon as they arrive as the delicate roots can dry out quickly.
- Move pots with tender plants in to the shed or garage to keep them frost free over winter. Cut back foliage if required or cover with fleece for an extra layer of protection.
- Collect seeds from hardy perennials such as Hollyhock, Foxglove, Poppy and Astrantia. Store in envelopes in a dry place ready for sowing in spring, or scatter around the garden where you want them to grow next year.

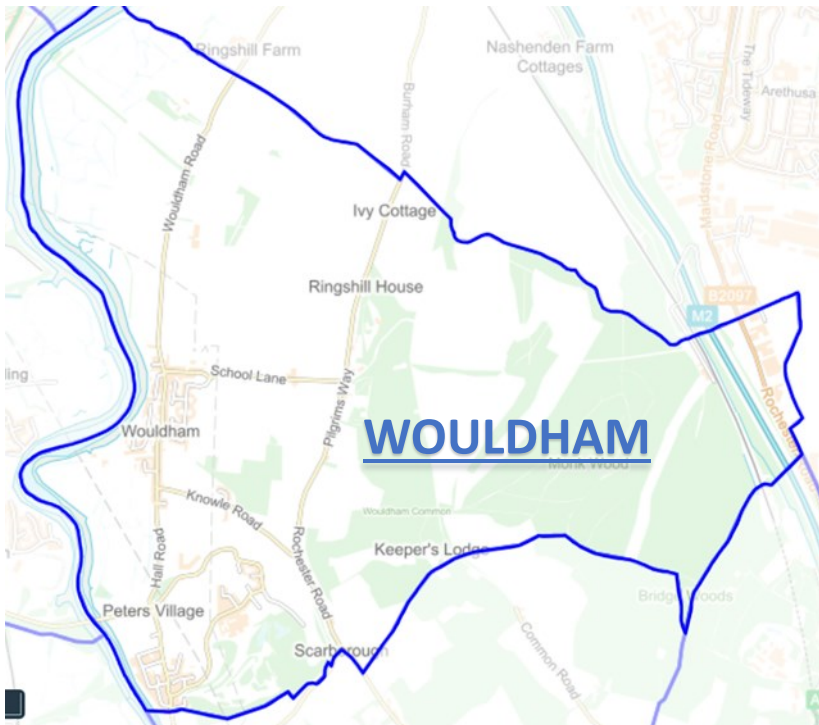
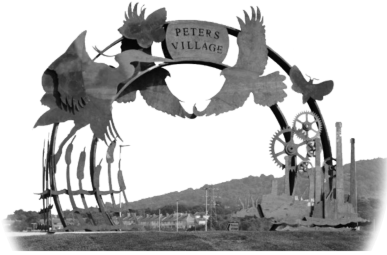
