Our joint service of Café Church which we celebrate with the Methodist Community continues to go well. We meet once a month at the Burham Old School Community Centre on the third Sunday of the month at 3pm — well, more or less; it does depend slightly on when everybody has managed to get cake and drinks in front of them. This is a very informal service and everybody is welcome.

This November, there will be a Confirmation Service in the group of churches, of which All Saints is part. If you feel that this is something you would like to explore, please contact me and I would be really happy to talk to you. You can either ring me or email me. My working days are Wednesday, Thursday, Friday or Saturday and Sunday. I will endeavour to get back to you as soon as possible.

Life is like a flower. You have to enjoy its beauty before Summer ends.

What a summer it's been so far, hopefully the hot weather has encouraged everyone to make more use of their gardens, and to celebrate outside spaces both near and far. The joy of summer is having the time, with the lighter evenings and the warmer weather, to sit out and make the most of our own outdoor spaces every day. The heat this year coupled with the general lack of rain across Kent, and the rest of the South East, highlights what a precious resource water is to us, and to all life. When our gardens suffer and the lawns turn brown, it's easy to despair, but if your plants are well established then both they and the lawn will recover once the weather cools down and rain arrives. It's certainly highlighted to me, especially given the likelihood that global warming and over-development will exacerbate the shortage of resources, that we should all try to harvest as much of our rain water as possible. The simplest way to achieve this is by installing water butts, or any rain collection system, onto all of the down pipes from our roofs, both of homes, sheds, garages and any other outbuildings/ Help conserve water by placing a bowl or bucket in the sink and shower to help capture some of the water that would normally run away, use this to water your plants, they don't mind if it's a bit soapy etc. – they will welcome being watered!!

As the summer starts to fade, the colours of late summer turn to the rich deep colours as if in tune with the leaves as they start to turn to their autumn colours. With Dahlia, Rudbeckia, Helenium, Canna and Achillea all flowering away, the garden takes on a new vibrancy, and with regular dead-heading these should all continue to flower right through until the first frosts. Make sure you are also deadheading any annuals that are flowering as this will encourage them to continue to flower through until autumn as well.

In the vegetable garden summer and autumn are times of great harvest, with tomatoes, beans, cucumbers, squashes and salads all continuing to produce. Making sure you regularly harvest your crops will also keep them wanting to produce more. Keeping them fed and watered, even more so in the dry conditions, will also encourage them to keep cropping. You can continue to sow quick cropping salads into September too, as well as Coriander, Rocket and Pak Choi which all prefer slightly cooler temperatures. Planting out of Spring Cabbages should also be done promptly, to give them time to establish before the winter sets in, and to hopefully give a good crop when Spring arrives. Early autumn is the final opportunity for pruning back Cherry and Plum trees, and for any summer pruning to remove water shoots from Apples and Pears

Other things to be doing in the garden now:

- Keep weeding if the ground is hard then still remove the tops as it will help control the spread.
- Start thinking about spring bulbs they will soon be available.
- Continue to water vigilantly pots and baskets will dry out quickly in both warm and windy weather so will need watering every day.
- Keep bird feeders and baths topped up as the dry weather will have meant food and water are in short supply.
 - Resume mowing only once the lawn has recovered from the dry and is in active growth until then, keeping edges trimmed will keep it looking neat.

Wouldham Football Club 1960 - 1961 (part 2)

By mid-October 1960 Wouldham Football Club were in fourth place of the Maidstone & District Football League's Premier Division, and were hoping to regain the league title, which had been won by Snodland – the rivals from across the river. Wouldham had won three and lost one in their opening league matches, and now faced their first real test: a trip across the Medway to play the reigning champions.

This match was played on Saturday 22 October 1960 and can be rightly billed as the heavyweight clash between the two biggest clubs in the Maidstone League. Snodland were defending champions, and Wouldham, as well as being last season's runners-up had been Maidstone League Champions in 1958-59 – before being dethroned by Snodland. In what must have been an exciting match at the Snodland Rec, Wouldham returned home the beaten team following a 3-2 win for Snodland, a result that meant Wouldham dropped to fifth place in the table, while Snodland moved into third.

After this defeat, as the autumn of 1960 progressed, Wouldham's fortunes improved and the team won all their remaining games of that year. (In fact Wouldham would remain unbeaten until February 1961). Their first win in this run of excellent results came in the Kent Junior Cup, as Wouldham defeated Sevenoaks 2-1 on Saturday 5 November. This victory was followed by a win in the league, as Wouldham defeated Maidstone 'A' 5-4 on Saturday 19 November.

The following Saturday brought a return to knock-out football, this time in the Maidstone League's Challenge Cup 'A' tournament, as Wouldham thrashed Barming United 10-0 in a second round tie. The next match was back in the Premier Division, and on Saturday 31 December Wouldham finished the calendar year with a fine win, this time beating Medway Sacks 4-0 in an away match. Despite these wins, the other top teams in the division had also been picking up points, so Wouldham remained in fifth place in the table, with a record of five wins from seven games.

After celebrating New Year's Eve (and without a day off to recuperate – New Year's Day would not become a Bank holiday until 1971) Wouldham had three home matches to look forward to in January:

21 January 1961 Reeds Medway Sacks (home)

28 January 1961 Snodland

(home) Kent Junior Cup Semi Final

WOULDHAM HISTORY

The Waterman's Arms

Address: 151 High Street, Wouldham, ME1 3TY

Tucked along High Street in Wouldham, The Waterman's Arms isn't just another pub; it's a living piece of local history. While its name might conjure images of tranquil river life, this pub's legacy runs far deeper, intertwining with the very fabric of the village.

The Waterman's Arms first appears in official records around 1845, with William Langford noted as its landlord. Fast forward to 1910, and the original structure was completely replaced by the impressive brick building we see today. It was during this demolition that a fascinating secret came to light: a hidden double roof space, or "smuggler's loft," clearly designed for stashing illicit spirits. This discovery cemented the pub's clandestine past, hinting at a time when contraband flowed as freely as the Medway River.

In its early days, The Waterman's Arms was a vital hub for the local workforce, serving river workers and lime-kiln labourers. The property even boasted a stable block and a large beer garden to its south, though these have since made way for terraced homes. Despite these modern changes, the core of the building remains largely as it was after its 1910 rebuild.

After the Langford era, the pub was stewarded by the Baker family for three generations, guiding it well into the 20th century. Wouldham's High Street once buzzed with up to six pubs, including the now-closed Black Robin, Rose & Crown, Dog & Partridge, and Forester's Arms. Today, The Waterman's Arms is one of only two still standing, alongside the Medway Inn, a true survivor.

Now proudly owned by Shepherd Neame and run by two wonderful villagers, The Waterman's Arms continues to be a vibrant community hub. It's the place to go for real ale, family-friendly meals, lively quizzes, live music, and a welcoming beer garden.

Whether you're captivated by its Edwardian architecture, the lively pub atmosphere, or the intriguing tales of its smuggling past, The Waterman's Arms is a place brimming with stories—and well worth a visit for a drink and a chat.
