

In January we are launching another new service in Burham. This will be a weekday Communion Service. We will be meeting on the 2nd Friday of each month at 11am for a spoken Communion Service and we are, of course, open to anybody who wishes to join us. The first service will be on the 9th January.

ROADS/FOOTPATHS/GROUNDS MAINTENANCE

We are pleased to report that KCC have made progress on our suggested Highways Improvement Plan. They have marked up the area by the Medway Pub to install another dropped curb to make it easier to cross the road. Other actions in the pipeline include: redesigning Knowle Road signage and lineage to slow traffic and extend the 20mph speed limit. Flashing pedestrian signage on Village Road (as a crossing has been refused) and a new 'Welcome to Wouldham' sign on New Court Road

Also, it has been agreed that drainage work on Pilgrims Way will start in January. Hopefully, this will alleviate the regular flooding that occurs there when we have heavy rain.

NO ENTRY INTO HIGH STREET

There seems to have been some confusion with the new signage. KCC had to change it to a new (NO MOTORISED VEHICLE) sign to enable bicycles and horses to come through. For those who are unsure, a motorised vehicle is a CAR, VAN,TRUCK or MOTORBIKE!

KCC advised that: 'These changes are in response to objections from equestrians and the British Horse Society stating that they are legally unable to use Wouldham High Street due to the introduction of the No Entry restriction installed in 2023/24. The scheme is essentially the same with the changes to the signage that have just been installed, but the type of restriction has been swapped from a No Entry gateway to a Prohibition of Motor Vehicles restriction which allows equestrians to travel through the gateway. The offence and fines associated with the prohibition of motor vehicles restrictions are still the same and can be enforced by Kent Police in the same way.'

DEFIBRILLATORS

LIFEBUOYS

As we all live near a very fast-moving river, the Parish Council have paid for Lifebuoys along the river in Peters Village. It is vital that these are always fit for purpose. They are checked monthly by Councillors and should only be opened in case of emergency.

PUBLIC OPEN SPACES

DOG POO! Parks, footpaths, other people's gardens - we really need ALL DOG OWNERS to do their bit. Just because it's dark in the early mornings and evenings, it doesn't mean that you don't need pick it up!

Volunteers regularly put bags around the village for EMERGENCY use. Please use these if you forget to take one out with you and DO NOT take handfuls (which people have been seen doing and is unfair on the volunteers who buy them for the benefit of the Parish).

WOULDHAM COMMON

BINS

Wouldham has the highest number of dog poo bins per person in the whole of the Borough, so there is no excuse not to use them! Also, whilst the majority of TMBC bins can also accept dog poo, PLEASE do not use the one on the footpath on the Recreation Ground. This is causing trouble with collections and we will have to remove it if it is the same when the warmer weather returns as it will make it unpleasant for anyone using the path.

MINDLESS VANDALISM

There appears to be a few people who do not care about the area and feel it's fun to destroy places/equipment that should be for the enjoyment of all. There has been a spate of mindless damage to the park in Peters Village which now has to be repaired/replaced by the Management Agent. These costs could go on your charges, so it is important that anyone with information comes forward. To encourage this, Medway Valley Services are offering a £200 reward for information leading to prosecution.



December - January in Your Garden

'Kindness is like snow, it beautifies everything it covers.'

Thankfully with the shortest day fast approaching, it means that we will be on our way to Spring before we know it. The joy of the festive season and the sparkle of twinkling lights in windows and across streets at least makes those dark frosty nights just that little bit more bearable. Whilst jobs in the garden are limited in the winter, it is an ideal time to spend reviewing the past year, and planning for the forthcoming one.

Whilst I am not one to follow trends particularly, the increased popularity of wild flowers and 'rewilding' over the past few years cannot be ignored. Wild flowers in themselves, especially en-masse, are a sight to behold without doubt, and their benefits to our native insects are countless, so its worth considering whether you have room for a small area of wildflowers in your green space. Beware however of rewilding, especially if you have limited garden space as the danger of leaving nature to take its course, will soon result in swathes of less desirable, and also more challenging to eradicate, weeds such as nettles and brambles. Another 'trend' that has risen in popularity is that of house plants. By way of 'bringing the outside in' there is now a fantastic selection of plants suitable for almost all indoor environments. Before jumping straight in however, do consider where you are planning on placing your plants, adequate daylight and being away from both draughts and heating are key considerations for house plants. Also consider their care requirements as some plants prefer higher humidity for instance, where some need to be left to dry out between watering - so bear in mind the level of commitment you are prepared to give to their maintenance – much the same as with you would with your outdoor space. Do invest in beautiful pots, as curating your plants to show them at their best will be easier in attractive containers. Also invest in a spray bottle to mist your plants regularly (once every week or two should suffice) – they will thank you for it.

In the same way, if you have pots in your garden, either empty or with bulbs or evergreen plants, curate these into an attractive display so that the view from your windows will give some pleasure over the winter months. Sorting out pots and containers is a fabulous winter task, empty out spent compost and previous contents, and either replace with winter bedding, or clean the pots ready for next season. If you don't want to use them in a display, then store them away in the meantime. Whilst it may be too late to plant bulbs yourself, there will be plenty of choice available in garden centres and nurseries if you want to add some extra colour to get through to spring.





Winter highlights the importance of evergreen trees and shrubs, as they help to maintain the structure of the garden through the winter, but also act as the backdrop through summer and autumn to the herbaceous plants that come and go each season. Including evergreens into your garden will also add winter interest to your space – obvious choices are holly, yew or euonymous, but there are also Mahonia, Pittosporum and Camelia (a small selection) that all keep their foliage through winter – there is bound to be at least one that will fit your space.

In the vegetable garden winter is a time for preparation for the coming season. It's time to clean the greenhouse, turn the compost heap, clean and organise your seed trays and review your seed store to make sure you have what you need for the up-coming season. If the weather is favourable it can also provide a good opportunity to prep beds ready for the new season, but resist the urge to walk on the beds if it's either very wet or frozen as this can end up damaging the soil structure. Some seeds such as Broad Beans, early peas and spring onions can be sown in winter for early crops next year. If you haven't planted out onions and garlic then January is the last opportunity to do so, but choose a time when the soil isn't frozen, & protect them for a few weeks until established as blackbirds and pigeons have a tendency to pull the sets from the ground.

Other things to be doing in the garden now:

- The festive season is a time that I like to extend the decorations out into the garden. Look out for baubles and lights that are suitable for outdoor use and adorn your trees, shrubs and fences to bring some additional sparkle to your outdoor space. Also use some sprigs of holly and conifer in vases and in wreaths to bring some greenery indoors too.
- Plant bare root trees and shrubs as well as fruit bushes. Also prune Gooseberries and Currants now to maintain a goblet shape for the new growth by removing a third of old stems to the base.
- Keep paths clean and clear of debris through winter to ensure a safe route through the garden should you need it. Applying some sand in frosty or icy conditions can help with grip too.
- Float a tennis ball in ponds to maintain an air hole in frozen weather, pond life will only survive a limited time in frozen ponds, and birds will appreciate still being able to get a drink.
- Feed birds regularly through winter as it can be a lifeline in cold conditions. Keep fresh water available too, & defrost it on freezing days.
- Clean and sharpen tools before storing over winter.
- & most importantly Have a Very Merry Christmas, and Wishing all our readers a Healthy & Prosperous New Year x



Wouldham Football Club 1960 - 1961 (part 4)



As January gave way to February in 1961, Wouldham Football Club had many reasons to be optimistic about their chances of silverware in the 1960-61 football season. They had just knocked Snodland out of the Kent Junior Cup 'A' at the semi-final stage following a 5-1 win, to reach the final (to be played on 18 February at Eccles), and were in impressive form in the Premier Division of the Maidstone & District Football League.

Before the Kent Junior Cup 'A' Final Wouldham travelled to Maidstone to play a league fixture against Coombe Estate, a game which they won 3-2. In the 1960-61 season only two points were awarded for wins, but the couple of points collected by Wouldham on Saturday 11 February moved the club from fifth in the league to third with a points total of 14. Above Wouldham were Len Social in second place with 19 points and Snodland in first place with 23 points. But due to Wouldham's successful cup runs the club had 5 games in hand over both Len and Snodland, which meant that if Wouldham could continue winning their league matches they would be contenders for the Maidstone & District League title. Next up for Wouldham in February 1961 was the Kent Junior Cup 'A' Final against Borough Green. This tie was played at Eccles, but unfortunately at the time of writing this article no report of the game has come to light, but the result was recorded in the Kent Messenger, which was a 5-4 victory for Borough Green to leave Wouldham as runners-up. With nine goals this final must have been an exciting game, so hopefully in the course of time and with further research a report of the game will come to light.

The following Saturday (25 February) brought a return to league action as Wouldham entertained Snodland FC at the Rec, a game Wouldham needed to win in order to keep closing the gap on table leaders Snodland. This was the third instalment of the Wouldham-Snodland football rivalry of the season, as Snodland had won the first league fixture 3-2 in October 1960, while Wouldham had knocked Snodland out of the Kent Junior Cup in January 1961. In what must have been a close game honours were even at full-time at Wouldham Rec following a 2-2 draw. A point each meant Snodland remained first and Wouldham third.

As the season moved into its last couple of months, the Kent Messenger captured the exciting prospect of a close finish in the Premier Division, as its report ahead of the games on Saturday 4 March noted that the 'fight for honours is reaching its climax' and that 'Wouldham, last year's runners-up cannot afford to drop a single point if they are to catch Snodland.' Wouldham's fixture list for March 1961 included those crucial league matches — and part four of the 1960-61 Wouldham-Snodland rivalry:

e-scooters know the law

What you need to know

e-scooters are classed as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), which means they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements, such as driving licence, insurance, number plates, lighting, road tax, crash helmets etc.

Without these, e-scooters cannot be used legally on the road.

The Government is currently trialling the use of approved rental e-scooters as environmentally friendly modes of transport in some specific locations in the UK.

For the rest of the country, under current law, e-scooters can only be used on private land.

What should I do now?

It's our priority to keep you and other road users safe. We are obliged to take action against anyone who is caught repeatedly using an e-scooter illegally or in a way that causes a nuisance to others. In these circumstances we have the power to seize the e-scooter under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act/165 of the Road Traffic Act – and we'd really prefer not to.

Please make sure you only use your e scooter on private land.
