# Trafalgar Day and Wouldham's Lasting Connection Through Walter Burke



Every year on **21st October**, people across Britain remember the **Battle of Trafalgar**, when Admiral Nelson led the Royal Navy to a famous victory in 1805. In Wouldham, Trafalgar Day is especially meaningful because of our village's link to **Walter Burke**, a long-standing resident of the village and a direct witness to Admiral Lord Nelson's final moments.

At Trafalgar he was the **purser** (in charge of supplies and money) on board Nelson's flagship, **HMS Victory**. He was 60 years old at the time, the oldest officer on board.

Unlike Nelson, Burke survived the battle and returned to Wouldham and lived at two local residences until his death in 1815 at the age of 79—**Purser Place** and **Burke House**. Although both were eventually dismantled, their materials were transported to Maresfield in East Sussex, where a new house was built in 1937 and given the name *Purser Place* to preserve the connection.

Wouldham Church also keeps part of his story alive: two large shell cases that once stood at the gates of Burke House—believed to be relics from HMS Victory—are now placed beneath the window of **All Saints Church**. His life and story give our village a lasting connection to one of the greatest naval battles in history.

Burke's gravestone in All Saints Churchyard carries a powerful inscription:

"He was Purser on His Majesty's Ship Victory in the glorious Battle of Trafalgar, and in his arms the immortal Nelson died."

For over **100 years**, pupils from **Wouldham All Saints Primary School** have marked Trafalgar Day by walking to the church to lay flowers on Burke's grave. This tradition reminds each new generation that history is not just something far away—it is part of our own village story.

It is a shame that a few do not respect the area, which has led to a disincentive to do anything, but we will try to make it much more welcoming over the coming years. #### AUTUMN CRAFTS

Make Your Own Leaf Lantern



As the evenings draw in, there's nothing lovelier than a warm glow on the windowsill or table. This simple craft uses autumn leaves to create a beautiful lantern—perfect for cosy evenings or as a seasonal decoration. You will need:

- A clean glass jar (jam jars or coffee jars work well)
- Autumn leaves (freshly fallen, not too dry or crumbly)
- PVA glue (or Mod Podge if you have it)
- A paintbrush or sponge brush
- String or ribbon (optional, for decoration)
- A tealight candle (real or battery-operated)

#### Instructions:

- 1. Gather your leaves. Choose ones with bright colours—reds, oranges, yellows and browns all work well. Try pressing them between sheets of kitchen paper for a day if they're very curly.
- 2. Prepare your jar. Wash and dry it thoroughly, removing any labels.
- 3. Apply the glue. Brush a thin layer of glue directly onto the glass.
- 4. Add the leaves. Press your leaves onto the glued surface, smoothing them gently with your fingers. Overlap them slightly to cover the glass
- 5. Seal it. Once the jar is covered, brush another thin coat of glue over the leaves to help them stick and last longer.
- 6. Decorate. Tie string, raffia or ribbon around the rim for a rustic touch.
- 7. Add your light. Place a tealight inside—battery candles are safest, especially if children are involved.

#### **Volunteers Needed to Support Wouldham Families**

Can you spare a couple of hours a week to support a family in the Wouldham area? Charity Home Start South West Kent needs people with parenting experience to support families with babies and young children. #### October/November in Your Garden

'I hope I can be the Autumn leaf, who looked at the sky and lived. And when it was time to leave, gracefully it knew life was a gift.'

What a difference a month can make. It seems as though we have gone from the arid heat of summer through to monsoons heralding the start of autumn. The grass has now recovered and is back into the regular routine of cutting until the temperatures drop and the days shorten at the end of the month to allow it to rest over winter.

Whilst the weather is still mild, Aster, Echinacea, Rudbeckia, Roses and Dahlia are still blooming, and will continue until the first frosts, October is a time when the garden begins to fade and summer blooms that have finished flowering can now been cut back and added to the compost heap — although do leave some in-situ to create hibernation stations for our beneficial insects, these can then be cut back in spring. Collect seeds from your annuals and perennials such as Aquilegia, Sweet William and Lavender for sowing in early spring to create additional plants for free. Trim hedges by the end of Nov to tidy them ready for winter, and also to do an autumn feed treatment on the lawn and cut/trim the edges as this will help to keep them looking neat over winter. As the leaves change through their glorious autumn colours before falling to the ground, sweep them up and gather into heaps or sacks as these can be mulched down to be used as a soil conditioner. It's also a good time to plant any evergreen shrubs and bare root trees, as long as the soil is still warm, the roots will quickly settle in and establish in the warm moist soil.

In the vegetable garden, autumn is a great time of harvesting and preserving. Preserves and pickles have long been used as the method for storing fruits and vegetables for use through the winter seasons. Blackberries, plums and loganberries can be made into jam, apples and pears can be peeled and cored and frozen for use in crumbles, beetroot, chillies and cucumbers can be pickled to be used with salads or sandwiches, carrots, cauliflower, fennel courgettes and beans can all be made into piccalilli, tomatoes, chillies, courgettes, squashes and sweetcorn can also be frozen either raw or cooked ready for use in soups and sauces through winter. Or if you prefer, many soft and stone fruits can also be preserved in gin, vodka or rum to make a warming winter tipple.

Other things to be doing in the garden now:

Plant out spring bulbs in gaps in the borders — Crocus, Narcissus, Bluebells, Aconites and Camassia will all provide early colour.

- Continue to water pots and baskets through until the frosts as they will still dry out quickly on warm days.
- Keep an eye on overnight temperatures, and if frost is forecast protect tender plants or bring inside if cold weather persists.
- Clean and tidy sheds and greenhouses ready for winter storage and in preparation of starting spring sowings in the new year.

# e-scooters — know the law

#### What you need to know

e-scooters are classed as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), which means they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements, such as driving licence, insurance, number plates, lighting, road tax, crash helmets etc.

#### Without these, e-scooters cannot be used legally on the road.

The Government is currently trialling the use of approved rental e-scooters as environmentally friendly modes of transport in some specific locations in the UK.

For the rest of the country, under current law, e-scooters can only be used on private land.



#### What should I do now?

It's our priority to keep you and other road users safe. We are obliged to take action against anyone who is caught repeatedly using an e-scooter illegally or in a way that causes a nuisance to others. In these circumstances we have the power to seize the e-scooter under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act/165 of the Road Traffic Act – and we'd really prefer not to.

Please make sure you only use your e scooter on private land.

#### Wouldham Football Club 1960 – 1961 (part 3)

January 1961 opened with Wouldham FC in sixth place in the Premier Division of the Maidstone & District Football League, with a record of five wins and two defeats from their first seven league matches. Wouldham were also still involved in the League's Challenge Cup 'A' competition and the Kent Junior Cup, so the New Year began with plenty of local optimism, especially as 1960 had finished with a fine run of results for Wouldham, the highlight being a 10-0 win over Barming United in the Challenge Cup.

This competition provided Wouldham with its first game in 1961, as Saturday 7 January brought the visit of Maidstone Centrals FC to Wouldham Rec for a third round tie. Wouldham's outstanding form in knock- out football continued with a 7-0 victory, which secured a semi-final against rivals Snodland. This match would be the season's second semi-final against Snodland, as Wouldham had already reached the semi of the Kent Junior Cup, a game to be played against Snodland on 28 January.

A week before this first semi-final against Snodland, Wouldham were back in Maidstone League action, and gained another two points with a 4-1 win against Reeds Medway Sacks at the Rec. This win moved Wouldham to fifth in the table and continued to close the gap on Snodland who were top of the division, and must have increased the anticipation for the next instalment of the Wouldham-Snodland football rivalry prior to the Kent Junior Cup semi-final. Both clubs were in an excellent run of form: following Wouldham's 3-2 defeat to Snodland in the league in October 1960, they had won all their games since, while Snodland (in the same period) had won nine and drawn two. This was a semi-final between two football clubs unaccustomed to losing. However by the full-time whistle at the Rec, it was Wouldham who celebrated progression to the Kent Junior Cup final following a 5-1 victory.

After knocking Snodland out of one cup competition, Wouldham could now turn their attention to reducing Snodland's lead of seven points in the Premier Division table. February promised to be an exciting month, with two league fixtures (one another clash with Snodland) and the cup final:

11 February 1961 Coombe Estate (away) Premier Division, Maidstone League

18 February 1961 Borough Green (Eccles\*) Kent Junior Cup Final

25 February 1961 Snodland (home) Premier Division, Maidstone League


