Dear friends

I'm writing this on 14th May which in the church calendar is the feast of Saint Matthias. Who on earth is he? You might well ask!

After the suicide of Judas, who had betrayed Jesus, the remaining 11 Apostles decided they should elect a 12th Apostle. They chose Matthias. After that he is never mentioned again in the bible! Also he wrote a gospel, but it was lost.

Some people have observed that this is what happens when decisions are left to committees. They say that if anyone deserved to be called the 12th Apostle it was Paul, who became far more wellknown, and did in fact call himself an apostle, and he was chosen by God and not the church!

But it seems to me that Matthias is a saint for these coronavirus times. I have observed in these weeks so many small acts of kindness by individuals, and the heroic acts of key workers in NHS and Care Homes and Care in the Community. These will not generally be recorded or go down in history, (though they may get a like on Facebook).

Yet taken together they change our lives and they change our community.

So today let's honour all of those unknown saints.

The Church in Burham (Methodist)

A message from the Revd Naomi Oates,
minister at the Church in Burham:



Dear friends,

I am sorry that, once again, these pages cannot offer a list of upcoming services and events at the Church in Burham – we’ll have to wait a little longer to gather together for Country Lunches and afternoon teas, Sunday services and film nights. But the Church in its truest sense is very much open for business – why not tune in for our live circuit services at 10.30 every Sunday, or dial in (if you’re not online) to one of our services by phone? (Please do get in touch with me using the details below for more information). We’re delighted, too, to be sharing with our friends from All Saints in lighting candles at 7.30pm on Wednesdays and praying for the needs of our community – something all of us are able to do from the safety of our own homes.

As I write, many churches are preparing for a global and ecumenical call to prayer called ‘Thy Kingdom Come’ that takes place between Ascension Day (21 May 2020) and Pentecost (31 May 2020). Although, as with so much of our lives, this movement will look very different in 2020 to any other year, one of the joys of prayer is that it can happen anywhere, anytime – and at any distance.

The period between Ascension Day (when Jesus, having risen from the dead, ascended into heaven) and Pentecost (when the disciples received the gift of the Holy Spirit and began the work that would form the foundations of the Christian Church) must have been a strange time for Jesus’ friends. They’d already been on an emotional rollercoaster, having watched the man they’d followed for three years be nailed to a cross, and then appear among them days later in a locked room. In the 40 days Jesus spent with them after their resurrection, perhaps they hoped this was their ‘new normal.’ I imagine they craved some certainty and stability – and an idea of what the future would hold.

But when Jesus left them a second time, ascending into heaven, their instructions were “not to leave Jerusalem” and to “wait there” for the promised gift of the Spirit. The disciples asked Jesus for details, timings – but Jesus replied, somewhat frustratingly, “it is not for you to know.” Many of us have struggled over recent weeks with the instruction to wait at home, and with not knowing exactly when and how the lockdown will be eased. Even as I write, after the Prime Minister’s announcement on 10 May, the future is far from certain. And yet. The Bible reminds us that

time spent waiting is *not* necessarily time wasted. In the waiting, God is at work, in and around us.

I certainly don't believe that God would send a virus (especially one that disproportionately affects the most vulnerable in society) to punish us or to 'teach us a lesson,' but I *do* believe that in the periods of our lives when we're called upon to wait, God can use these times as opportunities for transformation. For the disciples, between Ascension and Pentecost, I believe God was at work in their hearts, preparing them to receive the gift of the Spirit and for the hard work that lay ahead, which would cost several of them their lives. In recent weeks, during this time of watching and waiting, I've seen God at work in the way that people have gone the extra mile to love and support their neighbours; in fresh expressions of worship that have sprung up online and by phone; in the rare moments of silence and stillness. Time spent waiting on God is *never* time wasted. So perhaps, in the words of RS Thomas, rather than "hurrying on to a receding future" or "hankering after an imagined past," we might "turn aside" to see what God is doing in and through us while we wait.

Finally, as many of you know, one of our beloved members, Trevor Smith, died in May. Many people in the community have spoken to me since Trevor's death about his kindness in their moments of need, and his generous hospitality. There will be a service at the church, when such things are possible, so that we might give thanks together for Trevor's life. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

The impact of false information.

False information that is shared can take on a life of it's own and have serious consequences. It can lead to health scares, false accusations and potentially damaging hoax stories. It's not always easy to spot, so use the **SHARE** checklist

to make sure that you're using verified, trusted sources. Be careful what you share because things are not always what they seem online. Protect yourself and your family from misinformation and fraud by taking care when online . False medical advice false advice is based on false assertions that medical sources have disproven.

Full Fact <https://fullfact.org/> is the UK's independent fact checking charity.

USE THE **SHARE CHECKLIST: www.sharechecklist.gov.uk**

SOURCE. Before you like, comment or share online, use the **SHARE** checklist to make sure you're not contributing to the spread of harmful content about coronavirus. Rely on official sources for medical and safety information. Check the facts about coronavirus on the NHS website and www.gov.uk/

HEADLINE. Headlines don't always tell the full story. Always read to the end before you share articles about coronavirus for instance.

ANALYSE. Analyse the facts. If something sounds unbelievable, it very well might be. Independent fact-checking services are correcting false information about coronavirus every day.

ERROR. Look out for mistakes. Typos and other errors might mean the information is false. Official guidance about coronavirus will always have been carefully checked.

HELP FIGHT CYBER FRAUD

Take a breath – a moment – before you part with money or personal information. It sounds simple, but this alone could end up preventing fraud from taking place.

Ensure you are using the latest software, apps and operating systems on phones, tablets and laptops and update them regularly.

And if you get an unexpected or suspicious email or text message, don't click on the attachment or message.



Don't be afraid to challenge messages and messengers. It's ok to refuse or ignore requests for your money or details if you are suspicious – only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

The police and banks will never ask you to withdraw money or transfer it to a different account. Neither will they ask you to reveal your full banking password or PIN

You can check that requests are genuine by using a known number or email address to contact organisations directly. And if you think you have fallen victim to a scam, then contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud. You can report suspicious texts by forwarding the original message to 7726, which spells SPAM on your keypad.

For anyone interested in how the PC spends your money, all monthly and yearly finances are on our new website, following the successful internal auditors report, any interested person can inspect the accounting records. FLY TIPPERS ON HILL ROAD CAUGHT

One of our most beautiful walks goes from the carpark at Blue Bell Hill along Common Road—a quiet rural lane. Continuing past the Robin Hood Pub, the road ends and becomes a track, which is a byway called Hill Road leading down to Wouldham and Borstal.

In the last few weeks, a local resident cycling on Hill Road on the North Downs above Burham and Wouldham

witnessed people in a car unloading bags of rubbish as a fly tip. The witness noted details of the vehicle on their phone along with a good description of the occupants and sent them to Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council. The Council investigators tracked down the culprits and a heavy financial penalty of £400 was imposed.

Hill Road is a hot spot area for fly-tipping and is monitored by Tonbridge and Malling Borough Council, the local PCSO (*Police Community Support Officer*) and residents working together to reduce the amount of fly-tipping and take enforcement action.

In a statement our Borough Councillors said “ Fly tipping is an anti-social crime despoiling our beautiful countryside and we know our residents are rightfully upset about it. We are very pleased with this successful result and also that the Council will always take effective follow up action where good evidence exists”.

Helpline numbers and other very important details in relation to the outbreak will also be available from the window of the Parish Office, which has become a temporary noticeboard. So if you need any guidance or assistance, have a look in the window.

Neighbourhood Watch strengthens community spirit at Peters Village

As with the whole of Britain, coronavirus might have Peters Village under lockdown, but the crisis has highlighted the community spirit fostered by the Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch founded in April 2019.

The fledgling community, within the Parish of Wouldham, did not really have a crime problem, but Neighbourhood Watch co-founders Barry Abraham and Steve Rimmington believed the group could help deter any future problem.

Through Barry's previous experience as a Neighbourhood Watch coordinator elsewhere and Steve's overall experience working within the security sector, they realised it could also foster pro-active neighbourly co-operation against other issues, such as anti-social behaviour, littering, dog fouling, graffiti, and vehicles speeding through the community. Steve highlighted how much easier it is to run a Watch scheme today; where as members would previously have kept in touch by phone and knocking on doors, social media – notably WhatsApp and Facebook – enables instant alerts and updates, boosting effectiveness and confidence in the scheme.

The success of the Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) has been further supported by linking the group to the West Kent Neighbourhood Watch Association (WKNWA); Steve now sits on that group's committee and Peters Village NHW was recently spotlighted in the association's newsletter 'Watch Out'.

"Access to the West Kent association is particularly useful," said Steve. "Because criminal activities and anti-social behaviours occur across borough and parish boundaries, but any trends and patterns can be picked up from information fed into WKNWA from the various other local groups and police liaison."

Local issues do not always have a local source either, as Steve points out in the case of litter on the banks of the River Medway in Peters Village:

"We get a lot of plastics washing up under Peters Bridge. It is not generated locally but arrives on the river current. It is not only unsightly, but a potential danger to the local wildlife, of which we are particularly proud in Peters Village (the community has a Site of Special Scientific Interest nature reserve that conserves the Great Crested Newt and a number of other rare species).

"So, with support from Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council, which provided us with hi-vis vests, protective gloves, and other gear, we planned a community litter pick supporting the 'Great British Spring Clean'.

Unfortunately, the Covid 19 pandemic has caused a delay. Trenport (the overall Peters Village developer) and the Environment Agency have also given their support.”

“Ultimately though, the Neighbourhood Watch is about being seen to be active and showing that we will not put up with those who think it’s OK to spread litter, commit petty crime and vandalism or speed through our village, endangering our families.”

As a further development, Steve has set up Peters Village ‘Speedwatch’, joining a national initiative where active members of local communities join with the support of the police to monitor speeds of vehicles using speed detection equipment.

Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch co-founder, Steve Rimmington talks about the group’s establishment:

“I moved to Peters Village in July 2017 and could see the benefits of bringing people closer together through developing a stronger community spirit, and promoting confidence that something positive was being done to prevent local crime and anti-social behaviour, thereby improving the quality of life for all living there.

“Following research, it was clear that the Neighbourhood Watch network was the ideal voluntary organisation to deliver that objective.

“Neighbourhood Watch is a partnership between the police and local communities supported by various other local and regional organisations such as the Kent County Council Community Wardens, Kent Trading Standards and others aiming to help people protect themselves and their property.

“I’m grateful for all the advice and support I was given towards setting up the Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch, but particularly the Volunteer and Neighbourhood Watch Liaison Officer at Kent Police, Ourwatch.org.uk and the Neighbourhood Watch National Network.

“Of course, it was also vital to discover whether Peters Village residents thought a Neighbourhood Watch was a good idea and, more importantly, give actual support. Their response was hugely positive, so I set up and registered Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch in **April 2019** through the Ourwatch national network. “Once established, details were provided to all residents to register through the same network, to ensure they were legitimate residents of Peters Village, whilst providing them with security under the Data Protection Act (GDPR).

It was important that Peters Village also forged links to the regional network, so I registered with the excellent West Kent Neighbourhood Watch Association, with long-established links to Kent Police

“In addition to the registration process, I also created a private Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch page on Facebook with all registered members automatically added to the page. No one is accepted onto this page unless they have registered via Ourwatch to the Peters Village scheme.

“Facebook allows information from reliable sites such as the Kent Police and Crimestoppers to be circulated to all members, along with the regional information site E-watch, an invaluable source of wider information on events and incidents.

“Peters Village Neighbourhood Watch scheme members can also join our WhatsApp group, which is used to send out instant messages about suspicious activity within the community.

All residents are constantly encouraged to report all suspected criminal activity via 101, Crimestoppers or 999.”

THE HENRY PETERS CHARITY

This charity was set up by Henry Peters in his will around 1912 to be distributed to the sick and poor of Wouldham by the Parish Council. The trustees have agreed that the payments could be used to fund residents getting to and from the doctors’ surgery or hospital. 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JUNE in your Garden

*'Far up in the deep blue sky, great white clouds are floating by.
All the world is dressed in green, & many happy birds are seen.
Roses bright & sunshine clear, show that lovely June is here.'*

Before we know it mid-summer is upon us, with the longest day just a few weeks away. We have had some lovely weather, which hopefully means everyone has had time to enjoy their gardens & make them into a relaxing and enjoyable space in which to spend some time.

By now gardens are in full flow, with Roses, Lilies, Osteos & many other shrubs and perennials giving colourful displays. Lawns and hedges are both growing, with lawns now in a routine of regular cuts, and hedges able to be cut as nesting birds should have fledged by now. Its so enjoyable seeing additional birds and wildlife enjoying the garden, & encouraging a range of wildlife into your green space will create a wide bio-diversity within your garden which will mean that pest management is managed in a more natural way. Introducing a pond, even just a small pot of water, will increase the range of wildlife visiting your garden too.

If you have ventured into Growing you Own opportunities and created a growing patch in your garden, by now there should be salad leaves, peas and radish ready for harvest. Continue to sow crops like these as they are ready to harvest quickly. Remember its also possible to include edibles into your garden beds too, with salads coming in a range of colours, & beans and peas able to add height. It's not too late to sow beans or courgettes now for a late harvest, particularly if you have a warm spot for getting the seeds going. Now that garden centres have reopened it is possible to get either seeds or young plants if you prefer. Tomato, Chilli and Pepper plants sown earlier in the year should now be potted into their final growing spot, whether thats in large tubs or grow bags. Remember to plant tomatoes deeply, up to their first leaves, as they will put on extra roots below this point which all help the plant to take up food & water making strong, healthy & productive plants. Pinch out any side shoots (between the main stem and side branches) as soon as they appear. Feeding all vegetable plants through the summer, as well as keeping them well watered will encourage healthy crops further down the line. This is particularly important if you are growing your fruit & veg in pots as in the warm weather they dry out even quicker. Current bushes and berries will also be producing their crops now, be vigilant with these as hungry birds can make an easy feast of currents, blueberries and strawberries that are just coming to their peak of ripeness, so cover your plants with some close-knit mesh, old net curtains, or fleece (make sure its also secure at the bottom so they can't get in that way, or get trapped inside).

Other things to be doing in the garden now:

Neaten up hedges now, and make sure to feed and water them after having done so to help them recover & 'green-up' again quickly.

Keep dead-heading faded flowers from any annuals or perennials to encourage the plants to continue to flower. Simply pinch or cut the flower head off, taking it back to the nearest pair of leaves.

Fill pots & baskets with annuals such as Pelargonium, Begonia, Petunias, Lobelia etc. to create summer displays and to add additional colour where required. These can also be planted directly into beds and borders, or the pots placed in spaces in the borders too.

When watering pots or baskets (or the garden), make sure to water the soil not the leaves. Get under the leaves as much as possible to make sure the soil gets wet otherwise water will just evaporate from the leaves and the plant will remain thirsty – its best to water really well a couple of times a week than just giving it a quick go every day. Also ensure that feed is directed to the roots and not the leaves, you can use a general purpose dilutable feed in with your watering, or sprinkle granular feed around the base of plants and in pots, or use slow release pellets which will release nutrients over a longer length of time & reduce the need for regular feeding.

If you haven't already done so, you can Chelsea Chop some of your perennial plants to encourage later blooms and also a prolonged season of blooms. This can be done on Geranium, Phlox, Echinacea, Rudbeckia and many others.

Prune Plum & Cherry trees between now and September. Aim to remove congested branches now, & then cut back branches once the fruit has been harvested later in the season.

Keep bird bathes and feeders topped up as they will be busy feeding their young and teaching them the ways of the outside world.

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THE BATTLE OF THE MEDWAY AUTUMN AD43

Last month we saw how the Romans landed at Richborough in 43 AD with 4 Roman legions and many supporting troops. It was a force of about 45,000 men led by the Roman general Plautius and they were opposed by a coalition of British Iron Age tribes lead by the brothers Togodumnus and Caratacus.

The Romans probably advanced from Durovernum (Canterbury) to Durobrivis (Rochester) with their main force north of the ridge line of the North Downs. Along the ridge line there would have been a flank guard force and this was under Roman general, Gnaeus Hosidius who was Geta Plautius' second in command. At sea along the River Thames there would have been the Classis Britannica, the British Waters Roman navy which was mainly a supply force rather than a sea fighting force.

Part of the main force were the Batavian Auxiliaries who were specialist fighters. They were experts at estuarial river fighting as they came from lands around the Schelte; the massive delta of the Rivers Rhine and Meuse which dwarfed the estuary of the Thames and Medway.

The battle line up for the Romans had the II (Augusta) Legion under general Vespasian in the South in the area of what is now Burham, Peters Village, Wouldham Area. To their rear and part of the south flank guard was the XX (Valeria) Legion which was part of the force commanded by Gnaeus Hosidius Geta. North in the area of what is now Rochester Cathedral and Borstal was the XIV (Gemina) Legion and behind them in what is now Great Lines was the IX (Hispania) Legion.

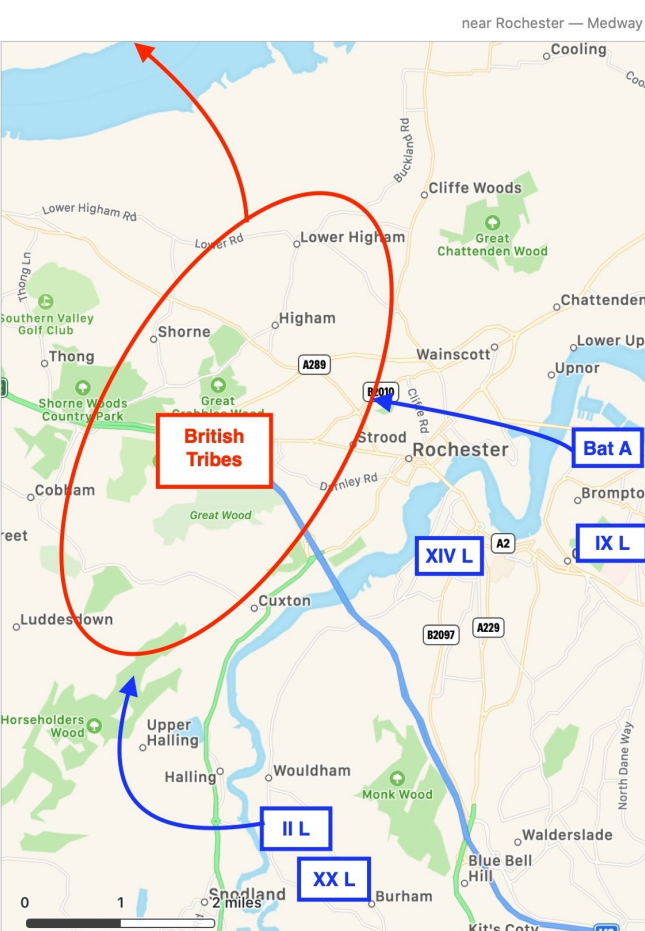
The British Tribes had withdrawn across the Medway destroying any bridges that perhaps existed. However we must note that the river today is narrower and deeper than at that time because of 2000 years of drainage and river works narrowing and deepening it.

The wealthiest of the tribesmen were master horsemen and charioteers and in open country they were highly effective with wide swing slashing swordsmanship. The Britons other than the chieftains carried only light-weight shields, swords and spears and, whilst being good warriors, were no match for the tactics of the Legions.

Having safely withdrawn across the Medway, the tribesmen felt safe and according to Roman historians, they were "Carelessly Camped" without adequate guards or lookouts. Caratacus was a good general but this was a bad mistake. Undetected the Batavian Auxiliaries with their war ponies swam the river Medway probably in the area of Upnor and threatened the Britons' line of communication and withdrawal. The British counter attacked quickly with horseman and charioteers.

However they were surprised and devastated by the Batavian tactics of directing their weaponry at the horses rather than the men thus destroying the mobility of the tribesmen.

With the British dealing with the Batavians in the north, Vespasian launched the II Augusta Legion across the River. We believe just a little south of what is now Peters Village. The crossing was successful but the Legion made slow progress against the British on the wooded slopes in the area from Holborough to Cuxton. Amazingly the British held the Legion for a whole day and were still in their positions at dawn the following day. Plautius then launched a hammer blow that morning with the Flank Guard under General Gnaeus Hosidius Geta including the XX Valerai Legion forcing its way deep into the British positions. So much so that the Roman General was almost captured in the fierce hand to hand fighting. So effective had this final blow been that Gnaeus Hosidius Geta was awarded



one of Rome's greatest honours of a triumphal procession through Rome.

The battle won, British tribes withdrew to the Thames crossing in the area from Higham Marshes to Tilbury. Togodumnus had been killed or died of wounds and Caratacus returned to his tribal lands in Essex to prepare for his final encounter with the Roman Army at Colchester.

The Romans did gain a bridgehead over the Thames immediately after the Battle but delayed there until Emperor Claudius arrived from Rome to supervise the final move into southern Britain which we will explore next time.



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Although we have had to postpone our upcoming trips, we have lots of exciting day excursions and holidays planned for when this unforgiving virus passes, and we are able to return to some kind of normality, doing what we love, travelling.
