Dear friends

We have just entered the churches season of Advent. I think this year will be the most meaningful Advent of our lifetimes.

Because Advent is all about waiting in hope.

Yes, that means waiting in hope for the coming of Christ, recalling the first Christmas, and looking forward to Christ's coming again.

But the context this year is also the waiting in hope for deliverance from the coronavirus, together with prayers for scientists and doctors working on vaccines and treatments. In Christian tradition waiting is not boring, it's not about kicking our heels wishing something else was going on. Rather it's about living in the present moment, and living life to the full whatever restrictions may be in place.

THE CHURCH IN BURHAM (Methodist)

A few years ago when some maintenance work was being carried, the workmen found a large banner in the basement. By good fortune, a member of the Church, who unfortunately is no longer with us, found a photo of the Sunday School, holding the banner. We don't know exactly how old the banner is, but in the photo there is a picture of a young lad whose name is on the War Memorial having died in the First World War.

Unfortunately when the banner was found, it had suffered some damage due to damp, with the tassels rotten and a small hole in it. Money was donated to the Church when Trevor Smith died earlier this year and the Church Council has agreed to put this towards the cost of renovating the banner.

Some experts have assessed the damage and are confident that restoration is possible. We have already had some generous donations towards the cost of the repairs, but we still need to raise about a further £500.

Another year has nearly passed and what a strange 2020 it's been. Virtual monthly meetings continue with a reduced agenda. Any items not included with these virtual meetings will not be forgotten, just on hold for the time being. Legally we are able to use virtual meetings currently up until May 2021 but it is hoped that face to face meeting can resume before then, when guidance changes.

Whilst the Covid 19 situation continues and we are forced to have Parish Council meetings virtually, as a reminder residents can still join in the meeting. An e-mail address would have to be provided. Any resident wishing to join in should contact me by noon on the Friday before any such meeting to have any questions/queries addressed to council members. Parking in parish owned car parks which include Bell Lane, Church Street, Village hall and Village Hall overflow: As a reminder all vehicles using these free of charge facilities must be taxed, MOT'd and insured and in a road worthy condition (All of these conditions apply not just some). SORN vehicles are not permitted nor are camper vans/mobile homes. Sleeping/ living in vehicles parked in these areas is also not permitted. Random vehicle checks are carried out and if a certain vehicle is found not to comply with the rules, a letter is placed on the vehicle requesting removal. (We have no facilities to trace the owners/registered keepers). If the vehicle is not removed, then the Police are contacted and a letter passed to the Police to pass on to the owner requesting removal,

Whilst I have chased TMBC in relation to the litter picking along the Pilgrims Way (Split road), their response was - mid October - "Sorry I have raised the issue however we still do not have the resources to carry out the work". I even requested that if we could provide the man power/labour would they be prepared to close the road and was advised "Sorry but this would not be possible. The cost of a total road closure would be very high". I will continue to chase on a regular basis.

I have also made enquiries again in relation to the Saturday bulky refuse collection via TMBC contractors. No date available when this service will resume.

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TMBC Parking Action Plan phase 12 (Informal Consultation): Proposed double yellow lines in Bell Lane to stop obstructive parking opposite the disabled bays near surgery, this is a safety priority.

New Court Rd footway/cycleway (breaking up from Church Street to Bell Lane): This was reported to KCC Highways (as the acting authority) back in July. We have been advised that "We (KCC) are currently pursuing revenue streams to fund the work and will update you once we know whether the work will be undertaken this financial year or if it will have to wait until post April 2021" We have now been advised that the work should be carried out on the 3 December for 2 nights from 1900 hrs until 0300 hrs. Highways are carrying out this work outside normal working hours to minimize the disruption to users given there is no alternative footway.

Remembrance Sunday 8th November: A social distance remembrance service took place at the war memorial at 2pm with the correct Covid 19 processes in place (no Church Service afterwards), which was well attended by over 25 residents.

Via social media, we have managed to secure 6 limited edition (run of 75) commemorative plates from an ex-Burham resident, who left the village 15 years ago. They feature Burham War Memorial, Vinnes Youth Club, Golden Eagle and Church Street, Village Hall, The Old Church and the Church in Church Street. In due course, they will be hung in the Parish Building for residents to view (once the building has re-opened to visitors). We would like to thank Mr. Trevor Rudge, the original owner. Over the last eight months or so with the Covid 19 situation changing rapidly, things can change at very short notice, so just check with me if you need clarification regarding any parish council issues.

Burham Parish Council would like to wish all our residents a very happy, healthy Christmas and good wishes for 2021.

Let's all hope that 2021 brings better news than 2020!! Stay Safe!

Nitrious Oxide Laughing Gas

In January 2020, the HSE warned young people through the mainstream media of the risks associated with using Nitrous Oxide 'laughing Gas' due to the increase in use within communities and at music festivals in 2019.

Soon to be published data from HSE and Trinity College Dublin in relation to drug trends last Summer at music festivals indicates that over a quarter of respondents to the survey had used Nitrous Oxide.

Nitrous Oxide is a depressant/ dissociative/inhalant type drug and is also known as Laughing Gas.

Whippets (cartridges of nitrous oxide), whippet. Chargers. Bulbs. NoS, N2O, balloons, hippee crack.

The gas has a number of industrial uses and is used clinically as an anaesthetic gas for pain relieving properties when mixed with air.

It is colourless gas and some say is slightly sweet smelling and tasting. It can be found in different forms such as whipped cream chargers 'whippets' which are small silver cartridges. It can also come as crackers with balloons attached or as balloons that have been filled with gas.

If it is inhaled this is sometimes referred to as nagging.

Some of the effects of using this drug after 10-30 seconds are:

- People feel euphoric, giddy and want to giggle.
- Some feel relaxed and calm.
- Some people may get a headache,

dizziness or blurred vision.

- Loss of balance and feeling unsteady or disorientation.
- Irritated respiratory tract the part that helps a person breath.
- Short lived paranoia.
- It can cause a change in blood pressure for some people or sudden death due to lack of oxygen.

Some of the Long term effects:

- · Mood changes and depression.
- People with heart blood pressure or mental health concerns could be at greater risk. Nitrous Oxide can cause a drop in oxygen levels which increase heart rate.
- Inhaling directly from the canister can damage the throat and lungs.
- · Risk of falling or accidents after use.
- People have died from suffocation or lack of oxygen.

Educating young people

Parents play an important role in educating young people of the risks associated with drug and alcohol use.

To help parents discuss substance use the HSE have produced a booklet to guide the conversation. You can down load HSE Parents Guide.

You will then get the facts and reduce the harm to your children who may be involved in taking these drugs.

Peters Village developer Trenport has announced that the Co-op will operate the community's new supermarket, with work expected to start by January 2021 and complete by the autumn.

Trenport MD Richard Hall said: "I'm not only delighted to announce a start on the supermarket after all the delays caused by this eventful year, but also to name the Co-op as the occupant. "I'm sure the store will be the focal point of the new village centre we are starting on soon, which includes three more shops, a dental surgery, and a community hall. Work will also begin shortly on a medical centre being built by the NHS."

Craig Smith, Co-op Acquisition Manager, said: "We are delighted to have the opportunity to serve Peters Village. We are always looking for new locations where we can develop the range, choice, products and services locally to create a truly compelling offer, conveniently. "We are committed to connecting communities and making a difference locally, and to operating at the heart of local life." Mr Smith added that shoppers who choose to become Co-op members are rewarded with 2p added to their membership account balance for every pound they spend on the store's own-brand products. The retailer shares a further 2% with community causes.

Members are also eligible for discounts across the Co-op group to make savings on funerals, insurance policies and legal products and services. Contactless card payment limits have been increased to £45, making it easier, quicker and safer to shop, and students who are TOTUM cardholders - the new name for NUS Extra – can enjoy a 10% discount off groceries at the Co-op.

The chain has also put measures in place to assist during the Covid-19 emergency: the Co-op Community Shopping Card enables those self-isolating or told to stay at home to shop and pay for their essentials; cards are bought or topped-up by calling 0800 029 4592, allowing friends, families, neighbours or volunteers to shop at the Co-op on their behalf. And the retailer's Food Share scheme works to minimise food waste and make a difference locally, supporting not-for-profit organisations who work to share food with those in need in the community.

A NEW YEAR START FOR PETERS VILLAGE CENTRE CONSTRUCTION

Work on creating the heart of Peters Village – including the shops and community centre – starts in January, according to the community's developer, Trenport.

Company CEO Richard Hall said: "Covid-19 has disrupted planning and building and driven up the cost of materials and logistics this year, on top of other issues not of our making – it's been 'a perfect storm'.

"But a new year can be a new start. Construction of all centre facilities will launch in January 2021, Covid permitting, beginning with the village hall, quickly followed by the supermarket and three further shops plus ancillary works such as landscaping, parking and a play area. 4

"We were also pleased to announce that the Co-op (see http://bit.ly/3lptSo5) will operate the supermarket. It is scheduled to open by autumn and will be a great fit for Peters Village, as the brand is known for its ethical and Fairtrade policies.

"The Co-op has also confirmed that the new store will run on 100% renewable energy, all of which chimes with the community's sustainable transport plan, nurturing of rare wildlife and the local Site of Special S cientific Interest (SSSI).

"Of course, we are disappointed by delays to the centre facilities due to external circumstances including Covid-19, but Peters Village had an unblemished record on construction timetables up to this point, with some previous elements even completed ahead of schedule, notably the new bridge.

"And Peters Village will gain enviable facilities; the community hall, for instance, is 25% larger than originally proposed after we took note of local input, and now includes changing rooms for the playing fields next door, which we have also upgraded"

Mr Hall said these points underlined how Trenport had always set the bar high on delivering Peters Village Creating an in-house blueprint for housing quality and upmarket style to give a harmonious look to the whole community, rather than a mixed appearance dictated by the preferred designs of different housebuilders

- Donating the land and financing a fine new school that is larger and better 'future-proofed' than the planning permission required
- Building a bridge that is both elegant and effective, cutting what had been a tortuous 25-minute drive from bank to bank to just one minute •

- Striving to ensure that the community is well served by public transport

 - · Preserving and commemorating the natural and human heritage of the site: there can be few new communities able to boast such an important SSSI.

These factors clearly played a part in Peters Village receiving a prestigious accolade at the annual First Time Buyer (FTB) readers' awards.

The 1,000-home community was the 'Highly Commended' runner-up in the Best New Development in the South category, which recognises sites offering "an exceptional range of new homes that stand out from the crowd whilst remaining accessible for first time buyers."

Richard Hall said afterwards: "We are delighted with this honour in one of the toughest FTB awards categories, especially as votes come from the magazine's readers in print and online – all prospective buyers.

"The award underlines why we have such a high rate of sale for homes at Peters Village and no shortage of housebuilder partners keen to develop here – we have just one development parcel left now.

"And Peters Village has a lot to attract first time buyers; through our partnership with the Government's Homes England department, housebuilders onsite have been able to offer a range of affordable options, enabling people to get onto the housing ladder in a rural location with great facilities."

FTB Editor Lynda Clark added her thoughts: "It has been a tough year for first time buyers, but with every challenge brings an opportunity to make a real difference.

DECEMBER in Your Garden

'May we all emerge from Winter with our strength renewed, & any unwanted pieces left under the ice.'

The days may be short, and distinctly colder, but there are still enough opportunities to be able to continue to enjoy your garden throughout winter. Once the rain and frosts arrive there are fewer tasks to do in the garden as there is less routine maintenance required, but the finer dry days still allow an opportunity to review what's looking good, and to plan for the coming year.

By now any tender plants should have been stored away for winter, and those that might get damaged by high winds or snow should also be moved to a more protected spot if possible. If we do get any snow, which might be more likely in the new year, make sure to knock any lying snow off hedges or branches where possible as the weight can often cause them to break. If the weather is still mild and there haven't been any prolonged spells of frost, then it is still possibly to mulch the ground with manure, compost or bark etc. This will help to protect your soil over winter from erosion (it's a bit like throwing a blanket over), and the worms and micro-organisms will work them into the soil to help nourish your plants come springtime.

One of the key opportunities at this time of year is to harvest evergreen shrubbery to bring into the house either in a vase, or use to create festive displays. There will be some lovely seed heads around, either in your garden or along wild hedgerows (although only pick a few as these provide valuable resources for local birds and bugs), together with holly, ivy and yew which are all festive favourites. You can add to these using winter Jasmine, brightly coloured stems of Cornus, Willow, Hawthorn & Euonymous all of which can add an extra dimension to your display. Every year I suggest also spreading your festive decorations out into the garden, bare branches lend themselves so well to a few baubles and fairy lights, & in the dark evenings it brings that extra sparkle to the view. So if you're out on a winter walk, think about the opportunities to create a display from stems and seed heads – they can be equally as beautiful at this time of year.

Winter is the ideal time to clean up your tools & sharpen those that might need it as they are less in use now. Any metal parts can be cleaned over with wire wool dipped in linseed oil, which will help clean them, but will also lubricate any joints, and wooden tools will also benefit from the oil to rejuvenate and protect them for next season. Make sure all tools are stored away safely over winter so they are clean and fresh ready for spring. Washing out any spare pots and trays is also good practice, so that they are clean and ready for use in the new year. continued

Collect up any last leaves now & bag up to make 'leaf mould', simply punch a few holes in a black sack, pack the leaves in, tie the sack, & leave for a year. Leaf mould is an excellent soil conditioner, and can also be used for potting up cuttings etc. in Spring, & you can make it for just the cost of a few black sacks. Leave the bag behind a shed or out of sight for a year for it to be fully rotted down & ready to use.

In the vegetable garden, root veg can still be harvested, and if prolonged cold weather is forecast then lift what you need and heel them into a lightly dug trench instead as this will make them easier to retrieve when required. Winter is the ideal opportunity to prepare beds ready for the new season, but it can be difficult in wet and cold conditions as this can cause more harm than good by either compacting the soil, or exacerbating erosion. The no-dig technique helps with these factors as it actively discourages digging, instead favouring the worms and micro-organisms to do all the hard work instead. By adding a deep layer of manure or compost on top of the soil & leaving it to be worked in, it encourages a stronger and healthier soil as a result. It's not for everyone, & if you prefer to dig, then the addition of manure or compost into your dug beds will also be beneficial for next season. Rotation of your crops is also key to the success of your produce as it helps to minimise opportunities for some pests & diseases that affect particular crops. There are guides available to help plan what crops will benefit from previous crops, and this can then inform next years' growing plan.

Other things to be doing in the garden now:

Continue to keep bird feeders and baths topped up, and defrost in freezing temperatures – winter is a hard time for our native birds so they will welcome any additional offerings.

Keep an eye on indoor plants, now the heating is on and natural light is less, their watering requirements will alter.

Take advantage of a bit of down time & peruse some seed catalogues – ordering now will mean you're well ahead for spring sowing.

Finish pruning Roses if you haven't done so already – cut back on an angle to an outward facing bud, reducing the overall height by approx. two-thirds.
